

River Festival

'Somewhere Over the Rainbow' July 25

by Mike Lange GUILFORD – The 11th annual Piscataquis River Festival gets underway on Saturday, July 25 with a full day of activities, starting with breakfast at the United Methodist Church at 7 a.m. and ending with a spectacular fireworks display after dark. This year's theme is the "Wizard of Oz" and parade participants

are encouraged to decorate their floats in the spirit of the 1939 classic movie

According to committee chair Carrie Fellows, the reaction has been great. "We've had a lot of people excited about the parade this year," Fellows said. "A lot of businesses are getting involved and our sponsorship response has been great."

The all-day celebration will be missing only one ingredient this year: the Herring Brothers Pig Scramble. "They decided to take a year off because of their workload and the expense," Fellows said. "But they'll be back next year for the bicentennial."

The 2016 festival, already in its planning stages, coincides with Guilford's 200th birthday.

But there are still plenty of family activities on tap during this weekend's celebration.

Community Fitness will host a free kid's fun run started at 8 a.m. at the center, and the first 24 youngsters that sign up will get a free t-shirt.

The River Festival 5-K for adults gets underway at 8:45 a.m. with registration at 8:15 a.m. The race fee is \$15 plus a food donation and more information is available at 876-4613.

The "Somewhere Over the Rainbow" parade through downtown Guilford starts at 9:30 a.m. and disbands at the ball field.

Fellows said that a cruise-in for classic cars is also on the schedule. which has worked well since many antique vehicles participate in the parade. "We've had anywhere from 15 to 45 cars in the parade, so many drivers bring them right down to the festival grounds," she said.

There will be live music by Dime Store Heroes from 1-5 p.m., a youngster's pie-eating contest at 2 p.m., the River Festival Rubber Duck Race at 3 p.m., music by Out of the Blue from 5-9 p.m. and fireworks after dark.

The popular tsunami water slide will be back along with the fire-fighters' fountain and bounce house for the energetic youngsters. Naturally, there will be plenty of food concessions from snacks to full dinners

Rubber duck sales are going very well, Fellows said. The first blue duck to cross the finish line will win \$250 for its lucky owner; the pink one, \$125; and the yellow duck, \$50. Ducks are on sale at the Guilford town office and several retail locations around town.

Fellows said that in addition to drawing big crowds to Guilford, the festival also allows nonprofit organizations to showcase their activities. "We have benefit softball tournaments every year with a very good response," she said. "In many cases, the parade floats will help promote local charities or community organization."

Piscataquis River Festival partners this year are Maine Highlands Credit Union, Hardwood Products/Puritan Medical Products, A.E. Robinson Oil Company, C.A. Dean Hospital, McKusick Petroleum, Mayo Regional Hospital, Thomas Logging & Forestry Inc. and Haley Construction.

Of course, nice weather would be the icing on the cake, but Fellows said she's optimistic. "Everything is on, rain or shine," she said. DOVER-FOXCROFT -The biggest challenge Gale Robinson had on Tuesday afternoon was keeping the awning over her sales counter from flying away.

"The breeze off the river is great, but sometimes you can have too much of it," she said with a laugh as she held onto the frame for a few minutes.

Robinson's Leaves and Blooms and Rollins Orchards were the only two vendors on site early last week at the Dover Cove Farmer's Market, but the duo attracted a steady stream of customers

The market is also in a new lo-cation this year: the Piscataquis Chamber of Commerce parking lot. For the past two seasons, they were located in the A.E. Robinson lot across the road from the Chamber, but were unable to use it this year. "They've been very good to us," Gale Robinson said. "But I understand they're doing something with the property this summer.'

Robinson added that the Chamber parking lot is smaller than the old venue, but there's plenty of room for more vendors.

Friday

"We're doing okay on Saturdays, but I'd like to see Tuesdays perk up a bit," she said.

Roger Drazek of Rollins Orchards agrees. "Gale and I have been with Dover Cove since we started out at the YMCA (on Park Street) four years ago," he said. "This is a much more visible location.'

In addition to Leaves and Blooms and Rollins, other Dover Cove Farmer's Market participants include the Pike Farm in Exeter, the River Run Farm and Spruce Mill Farm, both in Dover-Foxcroft; and Two Roads Farm in Sangerville

The market's operating hours are Tuesdays from 2-6 p.m. and Saturday from 9 a.m. - 1 p.m.

The market also offers space to any nonprofit or community service organization on a rotating basis. This week, Andy Vaness of the Piscataquis Public Health Council had a display set up about the Supplemental Assistance Nutritional Program (SNAP).

"It's a perfect venue for us, since one of our goals is to convince families to eat healthy foods," Vaness said. "You can't get

also accepts EBT cards and major credit cards for purchases This year, thanks to a grant from the USDA Food Insecurity Nutrition Incentive, SNAP and EBT shoppers who spend \$10 or more are eligible for up to \$10 in matching funds to spend on the locally-grown produce.

Betsy Daubenspeck of Houston, Texas has a summer home on Sebec Lake and visits the the Dover Cove Farmer's Market often. "They're such nice people," she said while Drazek weighed a bag of beans for her. "Fresh vegetables are so much better for you. It's nice to know where your food is grown, too

Rollins Orchards of Garland. founded in 1821, is one of the oldest family-owned farms in the region and probably in the state "Our specialty is apples," said Drazek. "But we also grow a nice variety of vegetables, raise our own beef and pork, make maple syrup and recently became a li-censed creamery," he said.

Leaves and Blooms is a fourthgeneration family farm, offering four seasons of farm products including lettuce, greens, herbs, eggs and homemade baked goods. They also make health and beauty products and offer farm-to-table catering.

Carol Clark of Dover-Foxcroft made a quick stop at Leaves and Blooms on her way to yoga class, but said she normally spends more time at the market. "Î definitely prefer fresh veg-etables," she said. "They're not only healthier, but they taste a lot better."

That's also the opinion of Derrick Buschmann, a teacher at Foxcroft Academy, who stopped by with his daughters Adelaide and Susannah. "I try to get down here as often as I can," he said. "The homemade breads are delicious. With a lot of farmers using greenhouses now, you can also get fresh fruit and vegetables right into late fall."

Conversely, Bushmann also likes the idea of getting a tradi-

by Mike Lange GUILFORD – Sometimes it's hard to convince a 5-year-old to sit still for a half-hour.

But on July 3, Lilly Burgess of Guilford and her mother, Katie, spent nearly nine hours outside of Goulette's IGA selling baked goods for the Make-A-Wish Foundation

"She only took two short breaks all day," said Katie Burgess. "The response was amazing. We raised \$1.479."
