# Meteorologist discusses his battle with depression at Greenville forum

GREENVILLE – Kevin Mannix came across as a happy-go-lucky meteorologist who interacted well with the on-air staff at WLBZ and WCSH television for over 25 years.

Off-camera, however, Mannix battled depression and lack of soffesteem for most of his adult life. "I identify as an ACOA: an adult child of an alcoholic," he said during an appearance at Shaw Public Library in Greenville last week. "During one eight-year stretch, I attended eight different schools. Sometimes we moved in the middle of the night, so I couldn't tell my friends that I'd never see them again. So after a few times, I said 'Why make friends if you're going to lose them? It was pretty painful."

Mannix said that he had never intended to talk about his struggles publicly until he met his wife, Linda Rota, a social worker who also had similar challenges from different causes. "The reason I didn't want to talk about it wasn't because I was afraid of losing my job or something like that," he said. I' didn't say anything because I thought no one would care – it wouldn't matter to you how I felt." But in 2013, the TV stations wanted Mannix to expand his presence

But in 2013, the TV stations wanted Mannix to expand his presence away from the weather maps "because I was getting stale," as he put it.

When he suggested that he host a series on his struggles as an ACOA, "They were thrilled," he said. "They were interested in doing public service programming on depression, but didn't have a 'face' behind it. So I volunteered mine."

Ten minutes after the first segment aired, the television stations received over 100 emails and Facebook messages, Mannix said.

Eventually, Mannix and his wife decided to collaborate on a book, "Weathering Shame." The purpose of the book was simply to bring the problems of depression and lack of self-esteem out in the open and *Continued on next page*

"reduce the shame and stigma in our society," Rota said. Rota said that her mother, who had been "in and out of a mental hospital," committed suicide when Rota was seven. "Fortunately, my dad raised us through some very tough times. He never told me to keep it (mom's suicide) a secret, but I always struggled about bringing it up if someone asked about her," she said.

Rota said she and her husband both sought professional counseling, but emphasized that she wasn't necessarily promoting it. "We both believe in it because it helped us," she said. "But we just want to encourage people to share their feelings, even with a neighbor, friend or minister. There isn't any set method of dealing with these issues."

Rota noted that people in the public eye like her husband have a unique problem trying to be "two people. Once he got off the air, his anxiety and depression ran his life."

Mannix said the "first step" – admitting there's a problem – is the toughest. "Sometimes, I take a step backwards," he said. "But I've never felt as bad as I did in the beginning."

Dinsmore's stepfather. Rodney "Jake" Page was born and raised in Dexter where he married Dinsmore's mother, June. "I attended school in Dexter for one year before we moved to Rumford where my stepfather taught school," she said.

Dinsmore said that after she graduated from high school, she got married but "had no clue what I would do for work. Later, my sons Michael and Christopher were born and I moved to Bangor and attended Bangor Community College."

She spent most of her adult life in Bangor working in social services before she started managing group homes. "I also provided a home for a young lady I worked with that had many challenges and she was part of our family until her death," Dinsmore recalled. "Mary-Ann was a young lady with Downs Syndrome and she had a smile that would melt your heart."

Dinsmore eventually became the owner of Home Living in Hampden, an agency that provides housing for adults with cognitive disabilities, and will be retiring at the end of this year.

She also served on the Dexter Town Council for three years.

"Dexter has become my home with my partner, Maggie Swan, and our four-legged 'kids," Dinsmore said. "In my free time, I enjoy camping, reading, working in the vard and - naturally -Kiwanis activities."

Their neighbors are Dinsmore's mother, June; sister, Karal and brother-in-law, Eric. "We call it the family compound," she said.



## **Greenville's Holy Family Parish** announces new capital campaign GREENVILLE

Family Parish in Greenville has announced the start of the "Beginning a New Century of Faith" capital campaign, with a goal of constructing a new church parish hall and offices, and renovating the current rectory.

"We've been talking about it for probably eight or 10 years that the building has been deteriorating and we've been putting Band-Aids on it trying to keep it. But it's gotten to the point that it's better to invest in a new building," said Elizabeth Foote, a member of the parish's development committee. "We have a lot of older parishioners. We're an aging community, and they can't come to the Mass because of the stairs."

"It would be a lot to repair it," said Steve Bilodeau, chair of the parish's building committee. "We're thinking in excess of a million dollars. But then, you're still left with a century-old church

that is difficult to get in, and that isn't designed for the community." For that reason, in addition to being energy efficient and containing enhancements like radiant heat in the floor, the new building will be one floor with no steps.

"I think because of how it's going to be on one floor, we will have new members," said Cecile Shields, who serves on the parish's building and development committees. "I think that definitely will make a difference for us absolutely."

The building, which will be constructed at the current church site on 145 Pritham Avenue, will also contain a new parish hall and offices. Across a newly paved parking lot, the current rectory will undergo a variety of interior and exterior renovations and the installation of an attached garage.

During the planning process, project organizers solicited input from many parishioners and discovered that replicating the look and feel of the current church was important to them.

"I think that parishioners are all going to be pleased that it's going to have a lot of character, and it's going to have a lot of history that it will carry forward with it," said Foote.

The new building will preserve the parish's history and tradition while offering new amenities. All 18 nave and sanctuary stained glass windows will be removed, restored, and reinstalled into the new church in the same locations.

The original confessionals and woodworking, tabernacle, and baptismal font will be incorporated. A beautiful spire will have the current cross memorial reinstalled at its top. The Holy Family statue will be placed on the façade of a covered entrance. The church bell will be installed in the belfry over the entrance. The windows, bell, and spire will have the ability to be lit at night. The narthex, or the gathering area between the entrance and the

church, will be warmly lit and appointed so that it is welcoming to all. Inside the new church, 20 white oak pews, which once stood in the Good Shepherd Sisters' convent in Old Orchard Beach, were gifted to the parish by Good Shepherd Parish in Saco. They will be installed

over new carpeting with increased spacing between the pews. The parish hall will have the capacity to seat over 150 people and will include a new kitchen.

"We believe that the parish hall will be the nicest room of its kind in town," said Bilodeau. "We look forward to the community using it."

The initial project timetable calls for the demolition of the current church in May of 2017. The construction of the new church, sanctuary, and nave - or central part of the building - would be completed by December of 2017. In 2018, the new parish offices and parish hall would be constructed inside the new church building, and improvements would be made to the rectory.

In total, cost projections are about \$1.7 million, but fundraising is already underway. A construction loan will be provided by the Diocesan Savings & Loan; Catholic Extension, a national fundraising organization which supports and strengthens dioceses across the country, will provide an additional grant; and individual donors have already contributed over \$675,000.

Keeping the project on schedule would allow the new church to be opened by Christmas of 2017, which is the 100th anniversary of the parish

# Sebec Lake 2016 Lake Mapping Project underway

SEBEC - Cloudy skies, cool temps and rough water did not deter the Sebec Lake Invasive Plant Patrol from starting the 2016 mapping season this past weekend.

"It turns out those cloudy skies are perfect for viewing under the surface," said Brian Krause, team member and member of the faculty at the Foxcroft Academy. "There's far less glare and the equipment we use performs well even in rough water."

The team picked up in Newëll Cove, where they initiated the mapping / monitoring effort last summer. After evaluating the 2015 essens, the team is evolving their methods to better meet the specific conditions of Sebec Lake. "We tried something a bit different this session, putting the observer in the water, using the trunk scope walking along the shore out to about five feet deep." said Rady Davis, Project director. "This person is shadowed by a recorder in a boat who makes a record of where vegetation is seen, what type, density, etc." Davis explained that this system worked very efficiently. A two person team was able to cover nearly a half mile of shoreline in a boat on to make. "We've observed that Sebec Lake, despite being one of the clearest, cleanest and deepest lakes in Maine, typically sees little or no vegetation beyond 6–7 feet of water depth. That makes it quite walkable."

The results of the latest session continue to be excellent. "No invasives found", Krause said, "just healthy, native vegetation common to Maine lakes." Krause teaches in the science department at Foxcroft Academy and is getting students interested in the environment involved in the project.

The team currently has five more mapping sessions scheduled for this summer. "We have ambitious goals" said Davis. Anyone interested in joining the effort can contact Davis or Krause via the Sebec Lake Association website at www.sebeclakeassoc.com.

## Expanded AT visitor center opens in Monson

MONSON – A newly-expanded, full-time Appalachian Trail (A.T.) Visitor Center is now open at Monson Center for Community and Commerce, also known as the former Monson Elementary School. It will help hikers prepare for the unique circumstances and environment in the last section of the trail,

which extends through the boundaries of Baxter State Park (BSP). The center will be staffed seven days a week through Oct. 16 by the Appalachian Trail Conservancy

(ATC) and the Maine Appalachian Trail Club (MATC). At the center, hikers will learn about guidelines for hiking into BSP and the permits north-bounders now need for the final climb of Katahdin, the northern terminus of the A.T.

Northbound thru-hikers were previously exempt from BSP permit rules, while other categories of hikers and campers were required to obtain permits and reservations for their stay in the Park.

The ATC has developed those guidelines to help preserve the special nature of the Trail and manage the increasing number of long-distance hikers entering BSP. Strategically located in the last town northbound thru-hikers encounter before entering BSP, the visitor center allows them to pre-register for the Baxter Long Distance Hiker Permit cards and make plans for their stay in BSP and their ascent of Katahdin.

Long Distance inter remit carus and make plans for their stay in fish' and their ascent of Kalahah. The ATC is dedicated to increasing its presence on the A.T. in order to assist and educate hikers. The organization has developed a number of initiatives to minimize the impact of large groups on the A.T. in Baxter.

"These are common-sense principles that most hikers know but are particularly important to be reminded of as we all strive to preserve the hiking experience for everyone and the unique alpine environment to Katahdin," said Ron Tipton, Executive Director/CEO of the ATC. "Working closely with partner groups such as the Friends of Baxter State Park, Appalachian Long Distance Hikers Association and Baxter State Park staff, the Appalachian Trail Conservancy developed these smart-hiking guidelines to help preserve the Appalachian Trail experience for all who wish to hike the A.T."

In addition to educating hikers and providing information about local hiking opportunities, the visitor center has other benefits as well. For example, the center will support tourism in Piscataquis County and help Monson continue its critical role as an Appalachian Trail Community for all varieties of hikers and visitors interested in learning more about the A.T.

## Moosehead development group awarded grant

GREENVILLE – The Elmina B. Sewall Foundation, based in Freeport, recently announced the Moosehead Lake Region Economic Development Corporation (MLREDC) will receive a two-year \$175,000 grant.

The award is designated for development and implementation of two of the MLREDC's upcoming projects: a comprehensive regional wayfinding signage system for vehicles and pedestrians, and a regional master plan to guide the area's future growth and development.

The MLREDC is vetting contractors for the wayfinding sign project and anticipates the first phase will be installed by this fall.

MLREDC is in the process of issuing a request for proposals for regional planning consultants and anticipates the planning process will begin within a few months. The public is welcome and encouraged to participate in the upcoming planning workshops.

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

# 12th annual Piscataguis River Festival highlight's Guilford's Bicentennial

GUILFORD - The Piscataquis River Festival has been the biggest summer social event and drawing card to the town of Guilford for the past 12 years.

Recent parade themes included the Redneck Riverfest, Duck Dynasty and last year's colorful Wizard of Oz.

This year, however, organizers predict that the Piscataquis River Festival will be bigger and better than ever since the full day of activities on Saturday, July 30 coincides with the town's 200th anniversary

The parade will be larger, there will be more bands - including an appearance by an Elvis Presley tribute artist - and more familyfriendly events including a pie-eating contest, the return of the pig scramble, and a giant fireworks display at the finale.

Sales of bicentennial t-shirts and commemorative coffee mugs at the town office are brisk and tickets for the annual rubber duck race are also going well. Ducks are \$1, \$2 and \$5 each and the top finishers in each category earn cash prizes.

The day begins with breakfast at the United Methodist Church at 7 a.m., followed by a children's fun run and adult's 5K road race starting at the town's athletic field.

Guilford Memorial Library will host a book sale from 9 a.m. to noon and various food and craft vendors will be set up on the riverfront adjacent to the athletic field on Water Street.

The Bicentennial Parade begins at 9:30 a.m., the U.S. Post Office will have a special bicentennial cancellation booth set up and the official 200th anniversary ceremony and dedication gets under way at 11 a.m. at the athletic field.

Musical entertainment begins at 11 a.m. at the gazebo with the Sebasticook and H.J. Crosby Bands, and "Elvis" takes the stage from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m., courtesy of Lovell's Guilford Hardware.

Maine Highlands Federal Credit Union will host the first-ever River Festival youngster's pie eating contest behind the tennis courts starting at 1 p.m.

After a one-year hiatus, the Herring Brothers Pig Scramble will return to the riverfront at 1:30 p.m. When organizers first planned the event in 2014, they figured on 50 to 60 kids participating. However, on the day of the scramble, nearly 150 youngsters signed up and twice that many spectators lined the fenced-off area to watch them catch the critters.

The River Festival Duck Race begins at 3 p.m. and the "lucky ducks" that come across the finish line first will pay prizes of \$50, \$125 and \$250.

Country music band Cold Blue Steel entertains on stage from 1-5 p.m. followed by classic rockers Out of the Blue from 5-9 p.m., both sponsored by Maine Highlands FCU.

One issue from the 1930s had a photo that could have been culled from today's headlines. Police in Baltimore were charged with beating up a reporter who had the misfortune of taking a photo of a stolen car, thus "hindering the investigation."

The Guilford Citizen and Guilford Register carried a sizeable number of ads in the issues on file at the Guilford Historical Society Museum not only from Guilford, but surrounding communities.

If you were looking for a refrigerator back in the 1950s, you could buy or lease one from Central Maine Power Company or buy one outright from Western Auto for \$159.95.

Longtime residents can point out where places like S. J. Jackson Company, Leslie Adkins' wagon shop, Charles Herring's slaughterhouse, Skinner's Furniture Store, Weatherbee's Hardware and the Gold Nugget Restaurant once stood.

Unfortunately, businesses in downtown Guilford were lost to a raging fire in 1969. "It took down a whole block of stores, including Koritsky's, a barbershop, shoe repair shop and Crockett's Bakery," Goulette said. "They made awesome jelly donuts."


Eventually, much of the downtown area Guilford was rebuilt. But people also started to find other sources of news during the "golden age" of television and expansion of zoned editions of daily newspapers into rural communities.

But for several years, residents could keep up with the local – and international news – through Guilford's weeklies.

It was also economical. A subscription to the Guilford Recorder was only 1 a year.







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

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

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
