



Guest Column The Militarization of Police and its Effect on Community Policing

Guest Column by Allen Stehle There is an increasing concern in our local community over the militarization of the police and the tactics employed to protect citizens from violent criminal offenders. Dexter PD, Bangor PD and all other area law enforcement agencies can receive, and some have already received, surplus military equipment from the Pentagon and the U.S. Department of Homeland Security. This concern should be discussed in a transparent manner in our local communities and the residents should cooperate with state, county and municipal law-enforcement agencies to develop a community-policing model that is efficient, effective and non-threatening.

Law-enforcement administrators have a challenging task. They must balance the desirability of community involvement and a problem-solving approach with the safety of officers, the public, and the offenders while reacting to dangerous situations - the minority of

Should the Pentagon and Department of Homeland Security equip our local law- enforcement agencies with surplus massive military vehicles, body armor and grenade launchers from the wars that we fought in Iraq and Afghanistan? Could this training and equipment change the mindset of law enforcement officers from a communitypolicing approach focused on solving problems to one that views the public as an adversary?

These questions need to be discussed in a transparent manner with the public served to avoid the perception of a war-like "us-versusthem" approach to policing our communities.

Our policing culture came from Great Britain and the visionary Sir Robert Peel, who founded the Metropolitan Police in 1829, and developed nine principles of policing that form the foundation of community policing. Three of Peel's principles of policing deserve mention, as they reflect directly on this question of militarization and its effect on community policing.

"Police, at all times, should maintain a relationship with the public that gives reality to the historic tradition that the police are the public and the public are the police; the police being only members of the public who are paid to give full-time attention to duties which are incumbent on every citizen in the interests of community welfare and existence," Peel wrote.

The essence of community policing is based upon this principle and there cannot ever be an "us-versus-them" perception in the minds of police officers or the general public.

Two other principles Peel advocated are as follows: "Police use physical force to the extent necessary to secure observance of the law or to restore order only when the exercise of persuasion, advice and warning is found to be insufficient" and, "The degree of cooperation of the public that can be secured diminishes proportionately to the necessity of the use of physical force."

Police officers are trained to protect themselves and the public by using the minimal amount of force required to safely enforce the law. The use of force options can range from physical presence to deadly force, and each situation is unique.

One shoe does not fit every foot, and as a community we need to have a transparent discussion in how, or whether we should, limit any use of force options available, including the availability of military type equipment.

To a hammer, everything resembles a nail. I believe this point is the crux of the argument. Just because you have, or can get the equipment, does not mean our local law- enforcement agencies should do so

It is impossible to predict the future, and there are things that hap pen that are beyond what anyone thought could ever happen. A good example of this was the North Hollywood shootout in 1997. Larry Phillips and Emil Matasareanu, who wore black ski masks, reinforced military-grade body armor, and armed themselves with automatic weapons carried out their long-planned robbery of the Bank of America branch. In 44 minutes of gunfire the robbers, carrying more than 3,300 rounds, fired more than 1,100 armor-piercing bullets at more than 300 Los Angeles Police Department (LAPD) officers and citizens. LAPD officers could not match the firepower, and had to go to a local gun shop to get rifles and ammunition to try to match the threat. After this event, the LAPD started to equip their officers with surplus M-16s from the U.S. Department of Defense.

Do we militarize local law enforcement to counter the exception rather than the rule? Is it better to have it and not need it than need it and not have it?

I believe it is better to have all options available for the safety of the officer and the public, but only if it does not interfere with what Sir Robert Peel felt was the historic tradition that "the police are the public and the public are the police."

The discussion continues.

"A YES vote will support our work against the East West Corridor..."

To the Editor:

Many of you may be aware that a Dexter Concerned Citizen group has been meeting regularly for over two years. As a member of that group, I can agree with Lesley Fernow's remarks and concerns published in last week's Gazette regarding the East West Corridor. Our group in Dexter has been working to bring awareness of the negative impact that this project would likely bring. We know that the corridor project is not dead and that we need to continue our efforts to protect Dexter. We are aware and grateful for the increasing support from the Dexter community.

In our efforts to find a permanent solution to the EW Corridor, we asked the town council to include a referendum question on the Municipal Ballot in Nov. which asks the voters of Dexter if they want the town to prohibit construction of a corridor thru the town. A YES vote will support our work against the East West Corridor proposal and open the door for the town council to approve an ordinance to protect the rights of Dexter citizens including the right to say no to this project.

Last year, the towns of Sangerville and Parkman passed ordinances to protect their communities from the corridor. Efforts to pass ordinances in other towns were circumvented by those who support the corridor convincing members of those communities that the ordinance would restrict other activities in their towns. This misguided and inaccurate critique of the ordinance has left those communities without protection. As Lesley Fernow suggested, learning about how A Community Bill of Rights Ordinance works enables communities to adopt ordinances that protect citizen rights. The ordinance is intended to remove the debate from the regulatory system and raises the question: Can the citizens of a community adopt an ordinance to elevate their constitutionally guaranteed rights over those who would seek to violate them? These ordinances ONLY restrict a specific development project, in this case the East West Corridor. The Community Bill of Rights Ordinance does not restrict any other construction activities within the town, it only restricts those who seek to build a transportation and distribution corridor thru the town.

There are far too many development projects across our state and our country where corporate interests are allowed to take precedent over citizen efforts to protect the precious resource where we live. Too often people are forced to live where their clean air, water, and natural environment have been compromised by those who only wish to exploit these resources for personal gain. And typically those communities are left without benefit from the development.

Vote YES on the Referendum Question asking if you favor the town of Dexter prohibiting construction of a private transportation and distribution corridor including highways, pipelines, and high tension transmission line.

"Life has gone on in Sangerville just as it always has..."

To the Editor: On September 18th, 2013 Sangerville passed a Community Rights Based Ordinance banning private and public private transportation and distribution corridors. The purpose of the RBO was to prevent the

construction of Cianbro's proposed East/West Corridor that threatened to bisect the Town. At the 2013 Sangerville Annual Town Meeting the voters of Sangerville voted unanimously to adopt a moratorium to temporarily prevent the construction of the corridor through the Town and look for a solution to the proposed threat. A group of concerned citizens contacted the Community Environmental Legal Defense Fund and with their help wrote a Rights Based Ordinance [RBO] which later passed by a vote of 86 to 40.

The Sangerville RBO affirms the community's right to clean air and water, the scenic beauty of their town and the preservation of the ecosystem where they live. It asserts the community's right to selfgovernance as conveyed through the U.S. and Maine State constitutions. Who better than the local people to decide what kinds of development are appropriate in their Town?

At the time, the opponents of the RBO warned that it could be used by one neighbor to sue another neighbor. They said that the RBO would prevent people from building woods roads and driveways, and it would interfere with utility easements. Local businesses would be harmed, and the Town would be sued.

It is my observation that, now one year later, no one has been sued because of the RBO. Life has gone on in Sangerville just as it always has, with no negative consequences from the passage of the RBO. The East/West Corridor is still a threat, but Sangerville has demonstrated that small communities, when they find their collective voice, can assert their rights and say "No" to unwanted corporate projects. Bravo Sangerville!




