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

# Fix your cat by 5 months for \$5

DOVER-FOXCROFT - Because of the large number of unwanted and unplanned kittens born each year in Maine, there is a new campaign to promote "fixing felines by five." Cats who are altered before "maturity" will not produce unexpected early litters, not go into repeated stressful heat cycles and almost certainly not develop unwanted behaviors such as spraying and howling. Plus, they have a 91% reduced risk of developing mammary gland cancer.

If people spay cats before they can 'litter,' the number of unwanted cats will drop and homes can be found for those cats whose guardians can no longer care for them.

The campaign, funded by a grant to Marian's Dream and Spay Maine (www.spaymaine.org) from the Elmina B. Sewall Foundation, is called "Fix Your Cat by 5 Months." This grant is limited to residents of Piscataquis and Aroostook Counties. Low-income and working low-income households can get their cats fixed for just \$5. The slogan is "Fix your cat by 5 months for \$5!"

In Piscataquis County, Marian's Dream and Spay Maine have partnered with P.E.T.S in Dover-Foxcroft to schedule these \$5 surgeries. To see if you are eligible, call Mary at P.E.T.S at 564-8092.

The program is geared to fixing these cats by five months, but if people have older cats or feral cats who have not been "fixed" they too will be eligible for this service. There is a solution to the suffering of all these homeless cats and that is spaying and neutering and remembering that when you adopt a cat it is for life

# "...an aggressive group of 'lobbyists' ... "

To the Editor:

Some local residents have formed a loose association whose purpose is to express its "concern" for Dexter. Its advertised objective is to rally area residents and especially their Town Councilors/Select-people to stymie the construction of an odious East/West corridor by waving the NOT IN MY BACKYARD banner. The group has publically endorsed Dexter Council candidates who share the same motivation/strategy and may themselves be active members of the anti-E/W movement. In this manner, it hopes to "pack" the Council which in all probability will then enact legislation that will prevent the proposed roadway from destroying the local area.

Concerned Citizens for Dexter appears to be an aggressive group of "lobbyists" concentrating its energy to either drive a stake through the heart of a conceptual E/W corridor or, at a minimum, to influence the rerouting of, so far, an imaginary pathway on a map in order to protect the natural beauty and bucolic ambience of Dexter and its surrounding environment. While pursuing that vision, the Town of Dexter, itself, has fallen, and continues to slide into a state of decrepitude. If aesthetics is the driving force behind the groups anti-corridor position, perhaps it is time for the Concerned Citizens for Dexter to marshal its muscle toward improving the sad material state of Dexter and put the E/W highway on the back burner until it acquires some attackable form.

A more myopic view of our surroundings may be more profitable to the Town than a zealous opposition against what might turn out to be a mirage. Should the goal of seating an anti-E/W corridor majority of Dexter Councilors be achieved, the association should consider its mission accomplished and redirect its energy and persuasive power way from a futuristic macro-vision of the local area and toward a microvision of Dexter proper. Since its influence and persuasive power will have been proven, why couldn't it influence and persuade those like-minded Councilors to enact an ordinance which compels property owners (including the Town) to assume responsibility for the maintenance/appearance of their property?

Past attempts, by un-organized citizens concerned for Dexter, to persuade the Council to consider such legislation failed to gain traction because of contentious, opposing views within the working group formed to address the issue. The consequences of the resulting "Hands Off" policy are manifest in the many eyesores existing throughout the town.

While not everyone supports opposition to an E/W highway, most Dexter residents would applaud the efforts of the Concerned Citizens to get the town squared away. Ron Goldstone



Maine pond was the home to arctic char and brook trout and was a popular fishing destination. An illegal introduction of rainbow smelt threatened the native char population so a chemical reclamation occurred in the fall of 2012. IFW took extraordinary steps to preserve the native strains of both fish prior to the reclamation. We implanted radio telemetry tags in 10 adult char in the spring then returned in the fall to locate these fish and hopefully many others as they prepared for fall spawning. We were able to capture around 100 char, which included 9 of the 10 radio tagged fish, and nearly 300 adult brook trout which were then moved to Mountain Springs Trout Farm in Frenchville. These fish were raised and successfully spawned by hatchery operator Gary Picard. Several generations were reared as we began the process to restore the native species to Big Wadleigh Pond. One of the IFW's largest reclamations took place in early November 2012 in snow flurries and a "brisk" northwest wind. It was a Herculean effort by members of the Fishery Division with some much-appreciated help from the Engineering Division.

In the spring of 2013, the pond was deemed safe for restocking. Young char and brook trout were stocked into the pond in fall 2013 and 2014 along with all of the remaining brood fish. The native char from Big Wadleigh

Pond were particularly challenging to raise in the hatchery setting. These fish could only be fed once a day or health issues would arise. They were also prone to sparring with each other, especially as spawning season approached which resulted in iniuries and some mortality. Gary was able to overcome these issues and maintained a quality fish and had good success at rearing the young.

This past October we stocked the last remaining char into the pond. These fish were 3 years old and many were sexually mature and will attempt to spawn this fall. We stocked these fish in the area that we believe is the historical char spawning site in Big Wadleigh Pond. We have already observed brook trout fry in the pond so we are confident they will successfully reestablish. It is up to the char now to do their thing. The smelt have been eliminated and conditions are favorable for char to thrive once again. We will return in several years and attempt to verify successful reproduction of these unique coldwater gamefish. Funding for this massive project came from multiple sources and we especially want to acknowledge The Eastern Brook Trout Joint Venture, The Maine Outdoor Heritage Fund, Clayton Lake Woodlands Holdings, and the Natural Resource Education Center at Moosehead for their support.

Once their service was over, that more vocal support can diminish, and it can be hard to know who has served their country. 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
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# How to help veterans who've returned home from service





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

# From battlefield to boardroom... jobs report suggests more positive employment environment for military veterans

(BPT) - Employment opportunities seem to be on the upswing for military veterans, which is encouraging for the hundreds of thousands of service members returning from duty and veterans who are looking for new civilian career opportunities.

The unemployment rate for veterans dropped to 6.6 percent in 2013, according to the Bureau of Labor Statistics. While the news is positive, a 2013 University of Pheenix survey conducted by Harris Poll, revealed only one-third (33 percent) of active duty service members reported having made a transition plan for returning to civilian life after separation from the military.

"Service members acquire skills during their military careers that bring value and diverse experience to civilian workplaces," said University of Phoenix Military Relations vice president, retired Army Col. Garland Williams. "But some men and women leaving the service may not know how to market their skills as they transition to civilian jobs, and may therefore take jobs that do not leverage their experience. As thousands of men and women return from Iraq and Afghanistan to a highly competitive job market, it is imperative that they have a plan to translate their skills into fulfilling and enriching jobs."

If service members don't know where to start, there are resources such as the U.S. Department of Labor's Transitional Assistance Program (TAP) to help veterans translate their skills and find quality jobs.

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

Service members who have recently returned home might be interested in pursuing careers at firms recognized for hiring veterans. The military has a Best Veteran Employers list as well as current job postings for those companies. This list is updated frequently, so job kers should check it often. In additional to applying for current positions, service members may consider requesting informational interviews in advance of their job searches to make sure they have the necessary training to be considered for the roles.

Some universities also offer resources for members of the military community who want to understand the available career options, making it easier to get started or continue a career path. For example, the Military Skills Translator Tool provided by University of Phoenix takes a service member's military occupational specialty code and provides a list of civilian occupations that correlate to the job skills the service member used and refined while in the military. Each military job is linked directly to labor market data to provide background on jobs and the education required to enter a specific field. Service members can also earn college credit toward their degree programs based on their military experience.

Here are some additional tips offered by Williams to help active duty service members and veterans prepare for a civilian job search: Start early. Begin the transition process from military to civilian life as early as two years before being discharged.

Speak the language. Communicate military experience and training with words, not acronyms, which may not translate on a resume. Promote universal skills such as leadership, management, cooperation, teamwork and strategic thinking.

Don't be afraid to promote yourself. As every proud service member knows, there is a "we" vs. "me" mentality in the military. The ability to work in a team is important to communicate, but you also have to be willing to discuss your own contributions and results.


